MAX TO JOIN NATIONAL SQUAD!

Local Stirling High schoolboy, Max Flett, is "over the moon" after being selected by Basketball Scotland as one of twelve playing members of the Scotland Under 13 Boys National Development Squad.

After receiving the good news, Max said "I can't wait to play for Scotland, I'm so excited and really looking forward to playing with a few good friends who have also been selected to join the squad. We'll do our best in Andorra for sure!"

Jennifer Abernethy, Principal Teacher of PE at Stirling High School said "What a wonderful achievement for Max. His hard work has certainly paid off!"

The twelve strong squad will travel to Andorra to participate in the TIM Pirineus Tournament, organised by the Andorran Basketball Federation. They will compete with other European teams from the 29th April to 1st May.

To ensure they make the trip, the squad need to raise funds of \pounds 3,000 between them. On the 4th of April, Max ran up Dumyat with his Dad, Andy and and former Stirling Knights player and now Glasgow Rocks professional basketball player Adam Hammerschmidt and has raised \pounds 930 - a big thank you to those who have sponsored Max so far. OH GRADYhow we miss you.

Just a week and a half ago, our second Guide Dog puppy, Grady, was taken in to further training at the training school at Forfar. Due to a 'blip' in the management of puppy production by Guide Dogs, he was getting on for 18 months before he left, which gave us four extra months to love him, and it was hard to see him go.

Grady is a Retriever/ Labrador, which is Guide Dogs major and preferred breed and he proved to be the best example of this mix. He was a star – the gentlest, best behaved dog, who has delighted us and all those who met him, throughout our time together. (We have to remember here, that we only have our black rascal, Guiness, as a benchmark!!) Guiness was withdrawn from Forfar after 12 weeks and is now an adored pet, living by the beach in a family with boys. Just perfect for him! We were delighted to have an update from his new owners at Christmas time.

However, only about 73% of puppies eventually go on to be guide dogs as there are often health issues as well as temperament difficulties which manifest during further training. They may well be passed on to other agencies such as the police, who use the German Shepherds, or become hearing, assistance or buddy dogs. This despite a very scientific and rigorous testing of the puppies when they are babies – dogs will be dogs!

While Grady was with us, we managed to do 14 talks to various groups of adults and children, and we really enjoyed this opportunity to inform folks about the work of GDBA. As always, we managed fundraising along the way and were particularly delighted when our local groups helped us in this way.

May we say a big thank you to you all.

Just this year, the association has been allocated several weekends to collect within the Thistle Centre – if you are ever shopping on those weekends, there will be lots of dogs around to cuddle near the back entrance of Debenhams!

For the last 2 months we have had a new wee puppy in our lives, another Retriever/Lab and have had a hilarious, hectic and delightful time with our two boys. Ian is a puppy sponsored and named by the Glasgow Vet School, and we are informed by our vet friends that he was probably named after one of the lecturers there. Hopefully we will find out, as we will be invited to visit when Ian is a bit older. When Ian arrived at 7 weeks, he was like a polar bear cub, but has since darkened in colour a little. More Guiness than Grady, we nickname him 'the missile', but he is the most loving little lad and learnt a lot from the big boy before he left.

It is sobering to know that there are 1500 puppies bred each year by GDBA and that does not meet the need. How fortunate are

those of us with functional sight. We are happy that we are able to play our part in transforming a life.

PILATES CLASSES AT COMMUNITY CENTRE

We are now moving into our second 6 week Pilates Block at the Community Centre and everyone who attended the first block has already reported an increase in their overall mobility and strength.

During the first block I introduced everyone to the key principles of Pilates - and how to apply these principles to some of the basic exercises. The Key Principles of Pilates are:-Concentration, Centering, Control, Breathing, and Flow. These principles are all used to perform one of the fundamental Pilates exercises which is Knee Fold.

Many of the Pilates key exercises involve being able to perform Knee Fold correctly as the exercise will help you find and work your deep core muscles and develop good pelvic stability. By learning how to perform this simple exercise you can learn how to move without tension and maintain length through the spine - therefore reducing the chances of injury.

The benefits of Knee Fold will give you smooth everyday movement patterns such as walking, climbing the stairs, bending and relief of back pain.

How to do Knee Fold

Alignment check:-

- Lie on your back with your legs bent, and feet hip width apart.
- Ensure feet are in line with your legs, toes pointing straight forward.
- Your neck should be long and relaxed.
- Shoulders should be dropped and your chest is open.
- Arms should be by your sides palms facing up.
- Your ribcage should be released onto the floor.
- Your spine and pelvis are in "neutral position" (not tucked in or arched).

The exercise:-

- Exhale as you lift your right foot of the mat and fold the knee upward to your body. Allow the weight of the leg to drop down into your hip socket. Remain grounded in your pelvis and long in the spine.
- Inhale and maintain the position, staying centred.
- Exhale as you slowly lower the leg back down and your foot on the mat.
- Repeat 5 times with each leg.

WIND FARM COMMUNITY BENEFIT

We are dismayed to have to tell you that we are still struggling to reach an agreement with the windfarm developers as to a fair division of the money. We met with them in March and found that their "preferred option" is equal shares for all 6 Communities involved. We believe this one size fits all approach is unfair to us for a variety of reasons, but chiefly the location of all but one of the the turbines is within our "territory"

They did promise to again review the detailed case that we have put forward and come back to us, this they have unfortunately failed to do. There is a problem in that the developers are under no obligation as to how they allocate Community Benefit. We will keep trying and it is to be hoped that with the commissioning of the new turbines due within weeks that the developers will see the need to finalise matters.

TRANSFER OF THE GLEBE GROUND INTO COMMUNITY OWNERSHIP

The legal processes in transferring the ownership of this area into the ownership of the Community Trust is ongoing. The Trust and Representatives of the Village Interests Association are working cooperatively on this.

Once the legal stuff is complete we will move into a consultation with Villagers where everyone will be able to have an input on how this asset should be used.

POLICE REPORT

PC Raymond Murphy and PC Steven Graham are the ward officers for the Forth and Endrick area, which incorporates Gargunnock and surrounding areas. Both are based at Balfron Police Office, and can be contacted at the office, on 101 or at

The current ward priorities for the Forth and Endrick area are Antisocial Behaviour, Road Safety, Theft and Community Engagement and Reassurance. The following is a summary of local policing activity since the last edition of The Bugle.

ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

In January, a motor car was deliberately damaged in Main Street, Gargunnock. One male was subsequently traced, charged and reported to the Procurator Fiscal in relation to this.

In January, a search warrant was executed at a residential property in Gargunnock. A quantity of controlled drugs were found within. Two males were reported to the Procurator Fiscal after being charged with drug supply and possession offences.

In January, one male was found to be in possession of Cannabis in Kirk Lane, Gargunnock, and was charged with this offence.

Between Tuesday, 5th April 2016 and Wednesday, 6th April 2016, deliberate damage was caused to a motor car on Stevenson Street, Gargunnock. Enquiry is ongoing in relation to this incident, but if anybody witnessed anything suspicious around that time, please contact Police Scotland or CrimeStoppers.

ROAD SAFETY

Since January, there have been two recorded road traffic collisions on the A811 near to Gargunnock. One of the collisions resulted in serious injury, and a driver involved was reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

The Central Scotland Safety Camera Partnership and Police Scotland have continued to perform speed enforcement and hi-visibility patrols in and around Gargunnock, resulting in a number of motorists being given advice regarding their vehicle or manner of driving, or prosecuted where appropriate.

The new 20mph speed limit throughout the village will undoubtedly contribute towards road safety and has been welcomed by local members of the community. Local ward officers, PC Murphy and PC Graham have carried out hi-visibility speed checks in the area to highlight the reduction in speed limit to motorists, and will continue to do so.

THEFT

Between Saturday, 5th March 2016 and Thursday, 17th March 2016, an attempt was made to gain access to a residential property in The Glebe, Gargunnock. Enquiry is ongoing in relation to this incident, but if anybody witnessed anything suspicious around that time, please contact Police Scotland or CrimeStoppers.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT and REASSURANCE

Over the past few months, PC Murphy and PC Graham have carried out patrols of the area, engaged with local people and businesses. They have also visited Gargunnock Primary School and introduced themselves to the pupils, as well as having a discussion with them about road safety.

Police Scotland Public Consultation Survey - Your View Counts

The Police Scotland Public Consultation Survey was launched on Thursday, 7th April 2016. In previous years, the survey was paperbased and involved community officers delivering and collating the surveys from members of the local community. This year, the survey has been placed online.

Update – Safer Routes to Schools Project

We have received a response to a letter written to Stirling Council to express our profound disappointment and frustration at the work undertaken at the school entrance on Station Road. Initially, it appeared that the promise of a safer access/egress to the school at the Station Road entrance had only partially been realised.

The reply has stated that implementation of the full project had been delayed by the extremely wet weather experienced over the last few months. I have been assured that Stirling Council are committed to this scheme and are looking to have the first phase fully completed by the end of April 2016. Further funding is required to complete phase 2 of the project (wider scheme for rest of village) which has a proposal for a new shared pedestrian cycle path on Station Road ensuring the safety of those approaching the School from the east. A modified design around the school entrance to that proposed in the consultation is to be installed.

The alternative design, which will be highly visible and has allegedly proved effective as a speed reduction measure at other locations. This feature will cover the full junction width and better emphasise the school access and need to reduce speed. A similar detail will be used at the other crossing point on Leckie Road. Vehicle speeds will be monitored for a period after introduction of the scheme (phase 1) and if necessary the project will be revisited should it not prove successful. All other aspects of the project remain as previously proposed.

Please observe the new ${\bf 20MPH}$ speed limit, it has been implemented to protect the children in the village.
