

Windfarm Panel Update - November 2022

At their October meeting the Windfarm Panel agreed the following awards for funding:

- Gargunnock Primary School £500 towards costs for a Gargunnock Show Theatre production.
- Development Trust £5181 towards the Community Centre Zero Carbon Project to deliver a £25,906 project which has received funding from CARES Net Zero Scotland.
- A Community Council application for £150 to retrospectively fund
 Defibrillator training was unfortunately not eligible as the rules for
 the fund exclude activity which has already taken place.
- During November a request was made by the Development Trust towards replacement pads for the Defibrillator and, if needed, necessary software updates. It was agreed in principle to award up to £500 to support as required.

The Windfarm Panel is comprised of community based volunteers including representatives from the Development Trust and the Community Council. They are responsible for making awards within the Gargunnock Community Council area from the FALK Renewables fund which is approx. £25,000 per annum.

The membership of the Panel changes annually as appointments only last for a predetermined length – and whilst it's always a shame to lose experience it is a great way to get new perspectives and ideas and involve a wide range of community members. The two Trust representatives Jill Patrick and Jon Park are in the process of being replaced and the Panel extended their thanks to them for their service. Vanessa Paynton was warmly welcomed as our newest Panel member at the October meeting.

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Primary School Update

Green Flag Status



We are delighted to announce that we have been awarded the renewal of our Green Flag status. This is in recognition of the efforts the children have made towards developing biodiversity through planting a new wildflower meadow and Jubilee garden, improving our school grounds through our new raised beds and through our continued efforts to recycle. We were also commended for our quality education opportunities working with community partners, On The Verge, The Good Bee Project alongside Gargunnock Beekeepers and with Flanders Moss.

This is great news and demonstrates how we tried really hard throughout the past year to keep our learning opportunities going when there was a pandemic around us.

P5/6 RHET visit

P5/6 visited United Auctions earlier this month to learn a bit more about food and farming. The event had a focus on Health & Wellbeing, Developing the Young Workforce, and Sustainable Living. There were a wide range of activity providers from across the food, farming and environmental sectors and the pupils learned lots about farm to fork food journeys and the benefits of buying local produce that has not travelled around the world before reaching our supermarkets.

Skills Academies

We have changed the way we do skills academy sessions in school. This year we are offering 4 week taster academies and are trying to show how the skills they are learning can be developed in the wider world. This term our Ukelele academy will perform at the Christmas concert, our Dance academy will participate in a Ceilidh at The Peak, and we are hoping to sell out jam and chutney at a local Christmas Fayre. Pupils are encouraged to explore and learn new things and open their thinking to new opportunities. If any member of the community has any particular skill set that we could utilise in our skills academies we would love to hear from you.

Outdoor classroom day

It was very windy for our Outdoor Classroom day and using tarpaulins didn't seem such a great idea when we started out but we all had a great time den building in our school grounds wooded area. Lots of pegs and bungees were available to tie everything down and we were away. There was great co-operation and teamwork on display and magnificent engagement from all. The pictures really speak for themselves.













Gargunnock Community Trust News

The well attended Trust AGM, held 27 October, heard from various trustees about the work of the Trust and the successes achieved over the past year. Highlights included a wide range of actions taken and being progressed to make the community centre zero carbon, the centre being the Trust's main capital asset. So far, the heating and hot water systems have been improved, the insulation in the roof has been increased while all the lighting is now LED. Full planning permission and grant funding has been secured to install solar panels and a battery. Grants for these improvements have come from the Windfarm Fund and CARES Net Zero Scotland. Together these improvements will help manage energy costs.

Further highlights included the trust's contribution to the Village Shop Working Group which included members from the trust, Community Council and other community members; with grant applications submitted should the need arise.

Updates from the Bee and Pond Groups showed the great progress they have made, enabled by the trust having secured ownership of the Glebe Park and installed the footpath a few years ago. The trust's paths group has continued to be very active with a focus on the Gargunnock to Stirling path. A further £500k from SUSTRANS has been secured for the detailed design phase, with the volunteer trustees involved having been

independently praised for the amount of progress they have achieved. Charlie's Loan footpath has been upgraded with volunteer labour and materials provided by Stirling Council. Progress has been made with the Hill Path with a detailed expert's report having been completed, while the Beechs' path will be progressed in the near future.

The operations of the Windfarm Fund, administered by the trust and managed by the Windfarm Fund Panel were explained and Alison Younger was thanked for her work as chair of the Panel, a position she has agreed to continue for a further two years. Bite and Blether has been reinstated following Covid with good attendances, proceeds helping to maintain the community centre. The

Bugle was published four times and Jon Park was thanked for stepping in as editor to ensure this important local

The company secretary's report provided assurance that all necessary corporate governance matters had been dealt with appropriately while the treasurer outlined the trust's positive financial position. The trust's banking was now all on-line, Xero accounting software had been purchased to help improve the efficiency of financial transactions and VAT returns; a new Windfarm Fund grant tracker had been introduced to help meet Foundation Scotland's requirements and Jon Park had worked with Debbie Masson, the community centre bookings administrator, to simplify the community centre pricing

The trust, including all the existing trustees/directors were thanked for their tremendous efforts and input during the year. Specifically, Jon Park was thanked for his significant contributions as he was stepping down as a trustee at the AGM. All the remaining nine trustees were reappointed by the meeting.

As no one else came forward at the meeting there remains three places on the Trust Board for new trustees; if you are interested in getting involved and want to contribute your skills, expertise and time to your community please drop an email to gargunnocktrust@gmail.com or speak to one of the trustees. It has been great to see so many people becoming involved in the various trust sub groups, however, without new trustees we will only be able to focus our volunteer time on projects which best fit the skills, interests and time of the existing volunteer trustees so the challenge has been set.....!

<u>Gargunnock Walking Group - November 2022</u>

The Gargunnock Walking Group has recently enjoyed some further excellent walks including Kirkton Glen at Balquhider, Braco Castle and Gardens, and a walk on farm tracks and paths between Dollar and Muckhart. On one of these walks we unexpectedly found an osprey's nest with two ospreys on it. The most recent walk was in Glen Artney. On previous occasions we have spotted large herds of deer and stags on the hill sides in the glen. On this occasion the weather was rather wet and windy and the best that we could do was spot a largish herd of deer, but no stags this time. As usual red kites were spotted in the glen.

The next walk is on Thursday 24th November, and if the weather is fair, we may make another attempt at a walk in one of the Hillfoots glens.

The walks will be decided nearer the time and will depend upon the weather.

Possibilities for further walks include return visits to the Dukes Trail, and Cashell Forest Park. New walks might include Dumgoyne, and around Auchterarder. I would expect to do repeat visits to favourite spring walks such as Glen Lednock near Comrie.

As usual these walks will depend up on the weather on the day. We want to maintain the tradition of walking on fine clear days when we expect to have stunning views of the surrounding countryside. And we are always on the look-out for new and interesting walks within easy access of Gargunnock

We normally gather at 9:30a.m. in the pub car park prior to starting our walk, and we always try to minimise the number of cars by sharing.

Please note that one of the few rules that we have is no dogs. The primary reason for this is that we occasionally walk though areas where livestock graze and I would not wish to be associated with anyone's dog however well-disciplined whilst in the vicinity of cattle. We also expect participants to be responsible for their own wellbeing and capable of going the distance of the walk.

Edmond Mansion



Many artists have been keen to record the beauty of our village on paper or canvas throughout the years. Many of their paintings survive to this day, mainly unseen, but they do pop up from time to time on the art market.

Top-left - The famous 19th/20th century etcher Sir Muirhead Bone visited our village on more than one occasion. He sketched this view of the houses in the Square, possibly during his visit in 1910. The gable end on the right is one of the basket making shops which stood just in front of the White House at that time.

Top-right - Both basket making shops are visible in this painting as are the White House and the Church beyond by another well known artist of the same era, Tomson Laing, who also created the two framed paintings of the Square. Almost identical except that the one on the left is a watercolour, while the other is not.

Upper Centre - This one is from an on-line catalogue of his works. He often depicted horses, sheep or cattle in rural or seashore settings.

Bottom Centre - View from McNeil Crescent 1970 by Joe McIntyre. This is the one that clinched the sale of the Kings house, Burnside, recently by verifying its 2-storey status in that year. I think this painting was found, a bit damaged, in a loft in Stevenson St. but I may be wrong. Some of his works are in Royal collections.

Many of these paintings were brought to my attention by our resident art expert Neil McCrae, who you may recall from his appearances on BBCs Antiques Roadshow some time back. Thanks Neil.

The other two barrels will be gifted to the school, and looked after by the kids, to encourage them to take an interest in gardening and nature.

In addition, a donation of £100 will be given to the school to assist in the expansion of their vegetable patch.

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Down at the Farm

It feels a bit like October arrived and someone turned on the tap. The wonderful dry-under-foot conditions of summer a distant memory as wellies squelch - with the additional weight of mud they also give legs an extra work out. Folks say though that there is 'no such thing as bad weather, just bad clothes' and I guess they are right. Back in the day when we walked the hills for leisure we had decent Gortex waterproofs. Water resistant but breathable. A few years in I gave up on such efforts – the costs not justified by lack of performance in the wear and tear department. At this time of year most farmers across the country are to be found in Flexithane. Essentially rubber coated trousers and jackets they are longer wearing and much cheaper – the main downside (other than only available in green) being that they don't breathe. Often you feel that you've been in a hot sauna for hours.

The morning routines have shifted – the cattle are now mostly in the shed. They need fed morning and night and the autumn calving period is well underway – so regular checks are essential through the day to both monitor imminent births and ensure new borns are sucking well. The tups have gone out with the ewes – on a 34 day schedule to do their work and hopefully sow the seeds for next years lambing. Sheep's fertility cycles every 17 days so the ewes are all effectively getting 2 opportunities to conceive. Experience in years past has led us to be strict on the number of days – with some always lambing a bit early, and some a bit late the busy lambing period can stretch on endlessly otherwise.

Our new hens have settled in well – though we anxiously watch the march of Avian Flu around the country. As I write England are already under a legal lockdown where birds must be housed – and all the signals are that Scotland will soon follow. New laying patterns are getting established – and whilst there are not many very large eggs to be had - they are following the natural pattern of getting slowly bigger and bigger so hopefully it wont be too long until these are back.

The freezers are full of pre Christmas butchery - loads of super tasty Leckie Pork sausages including seasonal favourites like chipolatas, smoky maple and chilli and red onion and sage – alongside a good stock of gluten free links. We've got a small number of super choice cuts – anyone for a 3 kg sirloin roast as a Xmas treat? Plenty of all the usual Highland Beef and Outdoor Reared Pork in stock so please do keep us, and other local producers and businesses, in mind as you plan your festive menus. As ever, free local home deliveries every Friday, or on farm pick up available anytime.
