

GARGUNNOCK PLAYGROUP & TODDLERS

We are excited to announce that in October, after much planning and preparation, we started trialling our new Woodland Play Sessions. For the first week of every month our playgroup sessions will be re-locating to a wonderful woodland area in the estate of Gargunnock House (Mondays and Thursday 0915-1130). Our Woodland Play Sessions aim to provide our children with an environment that they can shape and develop and which will offer them opportunities to explore, create and imagine their own games and activities, supported, but not directed, by motivated and enthusiastic adults. Young children need to take risks to learn about and understand their own capabilities. We will be providing them with a

safe and supportive environment in which to discover nature and take part in activities including den building, toasting marshmallows over an open fire, tree climbing and using tools safely. The children have thoroughly enjoyed the first two sessions, just about as much as the staff and parent helpers have! There has been such a buzz in the air during and after the sessions and we are all excited to see how this project develops over the next few months.



'I was delighted to be the duty parent for our first ever Woodland Play Session; probably even more excited than the children! It was a great experience to see them all gain confidence during the time we were in the "Jungle"- and to watch how they all looked out for, and after each other. I am so pleased that we are able to offer this service to the Gargunnock Playgroup children, and look forward to seeing how it supports their learning and development of some key life skills. Thanks to Jane, Louisa, Morna and all of the committee, who have worked so hard to make this happen.'

We are hoping to further develop these sessions through applying for funding and fundraising in order that we can purchase equipment and resources. If you would like to hear more about our woodland play sessions please don't hesitate to get in touch.

POLICE REPORT

The current ward priorities for the Forth and Endrick area are *Antisocial Behaviour*, *Road Safety*, *Theft* and *Community Engagement and Reassurance*. The following is a summary of local policing activity since the last edition of The Bugle.

Antisocial Behaviour

On Friday, 28th October 2016, police executed a search warrant at a residential property in Gargunnock. A quantity of controlled drugs were found within. Two males were apprehended and subsequently charged with allegedly being in possession of the drugs and being concerned in the supply of them. A report will be submitted to the Procurator Fiscal and the two males are expected to appear at court at a later date.

Road Safety

Between Saturday 1st October 2016 and Sunday 2nd October 2016, a parked vehicle was struck by another vehicle on Manse Brae, Gargunnock, causing damage to it. The driver of the offending vehicle failed to stop and has not reported this matter to police. Enquiry to date has failed to identify the vehicle or driver responsible, but if anyone has any information in relation to the collision, they are asked to contact Police Scotland or CrimeStoppers.

On Wednesday, 12th October 2016, a two vehicle road traffic collision occurred on the A811 near to Gargunnock. No injuries were sustained.

In the early hours of Saturday, 22nd October 2016, police stopped a vehicle on the A811 near to Gargunnock. The driver was found to be almost four times over the legal drink drive limit. She was arrested and detained in custody to appear at court the next lawful day.

Several people have contacted police raising concerns about the speed of vehicles in and around Gargunnock in recent weeks.

The Central Scotland Safety Camera Partnership and Police Scotland have continued to perform speed enforcement and hi-visibility patrols in and around Gargunnock, resulting in a number of motorists being given advice regarding their vehicle or manner of driving, or prosecuted where appropriate. We will continue to carry out such patrols and checks over the coming months.

One notable detection was a mini bus that was recorded travelling at 85mph on the A811 near to Gargunnock by the Central Scotland Safety Camera Partnership.

Theft

Between Thursday 20th October 2016 and Friday 21st October 2016, a hand tool was stolen from an insecure outbuilding at a farm in Gargunnock. A tap was also left running by the perpetrator, causing temporary flooding. Enquiry to date has failed to identify the person responsible, but if anyone has any relevant information, they are urged to contact Police Scotland or CrimeStoppers.

Community Engagement and Reassurance

Police Message to Local Residents

At 2am on Sunday 30th October the clocks went back an hour to mark the end of British Summer time. This also marks the start of the darker nights which can make it easier for thieves to target your property if they can see that nobody is home. We need your help to make it make it harder for the thieves so please consider the following:

- Use timer switches on lights and radios to make it look as if your home is occupied.
- Ensure all doors and windows are secure when you leave and when you go to bed.
- If possible use secure lighting at the front and back of your property.
- Make sure all garden tools and ladders are locked away when not being used. Don't give the thieves the tools to break into your house.
- Use a good quality lock on any garden sheds and outhouses.
- Make a note of all makes, models and serial numbers of expensive items in your home.
- create a FREE and secure inventory of all your personal property at www.immobilise.com
- If you note anything suspicious in your neighbourhood report it on 101.

Air Weapons Surrender Scheme

The Air Weapons and Licensing (Scotland) Act 2015 comes fully into effect on 31 December 2016. The new law will require any person who possesses, purchases, uses or acquires an air weapon to have a certificate to hold them legally.

It will be an offence not to have a certificate for these purposes from 31 December 2016, unless you are exempt, but you are now able to apply to Police Scotland for a certificate.

Local Police divisions have designated Police Offices where specially trained officers will be on hand to accept and make safe surrendered air weapons. Your local Police Offices are Stirling and Balfron.

Police Scotland Public Consultation Survey - Your View Counts

The Police Scotland Public Consultation Survey was launched on Thursday, 7th April 2016. In previous years, the survey was paper-based and involved community officers delivering and collating the surveys from members of the local community. This year, the survey has been placed online.

The survey allows local communities to provide feedback to Police Scotland in relation to a variety of topics, including the views of local people and what they feel local policing priorities should be in their communities.

40 METEORS!!

If you read Nick's article in the last bugle, you'll be aware that our astronomer son has fixed a web cam on the back of our house, pointing into the sky, which comes on every evening at dusk and goes off again at dawn, to film meteor activity over the north east of Scotland and beyond, up to the area between Shetland and Norway. It's fascinating living with this amazing equipment in his old bedroom and I spend far too much time standing at the monitor waiting for it to suddenly start recording as it detects a moving object. Some nights there's nothing because of the cloud cover. Other nights there are bats, owls and large moths hovering around, all looking ghostly in the black and white images on screen. Sometimes car headlights will reflect off our guttering and set off a recording. Every morning Nick tries to delete these other recordings before the system downloads all the clips from during night onto the website so hopefully what is saved onto the site are just meteors. Just meteors! How amazing to think that these literally out of this world objects are flying through our skies in so many numbers! There were 40 recorded on 4th November! Bonfire Night sent the camera crazy as it recorded every firework that whizzed up from displays and gardens around the area, especially our garden! The stats show that in the last month Gargunnock Meteor Cam website has been viewed online in many different countries and the top 5 are the UK, Belgium, Japan, France and Russia! If you'd like to come round and see it working then give us a ring. The winter months will make watching it in action more accessible as it is on during the early evening, so any time after around 5pm. Choose a clear night though!

CITY OF GLASGOW CHORUS BECAME THE FIRST SCOTTISH CHOIR TO PERFORM IN CHINA

And I was lucky enough to be one of the singers who joined the City of Glasgow Chorus tour.

I joined the choir a couple of years ago and became heavily involved with supporting the fundraising for this tour - organising my first ever Come and Sing event, as well as encouraging other choir members in their fundraising - doing headshaves, parachute jumps, supermarket bag packing, concerts, afternoon teas, markets, Our summer was especially busy as we had to squeeze in extra rehearsals on top of all the preparations.

As (paying) partners were encouraged, my husband David also joined the tour. China was never really on our list for visiting, but we're so glad that we had the chance to go, and would now think seriously about going back, if we had the chance.

Our impressions of China - Totally awesome.... and

- intense
- busy
- noisy
- dirty (some singers took to wearing face masks as pollution levels rose in Beiiing)
- welcoming and friendly people (blond and bald tour members were in great demand for their photographs to be taken - David included...)
- saf
- wet we hit Shanghai on the edge of a typhoon
- breathtaking (the pace of change and growth)

Our tour included three concerts - in Beijing, Nanjing, and Shanghai. We performed A Sea Symphony by Vaughan Williams in Beijing Concert Hall with IFC orchestra and singers. And then followed that with two performances of the Brahms Requiem (with accompaniment by two grand pianos) in Nanjing University of the Arts Concert Hall and Shanghai Symphony Orchestra Hall. The concerts were all very well received.

As well as travelling and singing, we also got time for some sightseeing - including the Forbidden City, Temple of Heaven, and Tiananmen Square in Beijing, The Great Wall , Confucius Temple in Nanjing, and then the Bund in Shanghai. The food everywhere was excellent - we ate , as a group (of 100 or so people), each day for breakfast and either lunch or evening meal. Such was the efficiency of service that, the choir was amply fed and 'watered' each time within an hour.

Highlights of the tour?

- The enthusiastic reception we got to our singing (even when we nearly prompted a diplomatic incident by singing at Tiananmen Square....)
- Travelling nearly 1000 miles in just over 3 hours on the bullet train (AND arriving on time)
- The beautiful autumn colours at the Great Wall of China
 - The grace, charm and tranquility of the city parks in Beijing
- The friendship and camaraderie that grew throughout the tour.

Would we do it all again? Almost certainly - but for now it's great to breathe in some fresh Scottish air again - and to hear birdsong when we walk.

THE BENEFITS OF PILATES FOR SPORT


