

Gargunnock Footbridge Update

The bridge painting is now complete. Fourteen volunteers from the local community gave 130 hours of their valuable time to this project. Refreshments were provided by an additional four volunteers to help keep them going. Some of the programmed days were cancelled, or had delayed starts, due to the wet or cold conditions forming condensation on the metal bridge.

On removing the layers of paint, the original colour of the bridge could be seen. This was a light pink colour and would have been the colour when it was a road bridge at Gartmore.

From what I have ascertained from many conversations held over this project the history of the bridge is roughly this:

Up to the 1960's there was no footbridge at this site. The village was much smaller than it is now with fewer houses and there were not many vehicles in the community so crossing the bridge by foot was not a problem. There was also a gap in the bridge wall, approximately 2/3 of the way across that allowed you to exit the bridge by foot before the end and access the footpath along the side of the burn towards Bridgend Cottage. As vehicles became more abundant in the village Stirling Council decided to install a footbridge at this location. They purchased some land of the garden of the cottage, Tigh Ealasaid, and constructed a wooden footbridge in the early 1960's. This was replaced with the current footbridge around 1975 when it became available from the decommissioned road bridge at Gartmore over the Keltie water. The current footbridge is a scaled down version of the road bridge, hence the over engineered look of it.

The bridge has been providing a good service to the community since its installation and will soon be reaching its 200 years of service, considering its former life as a road bridge. The cast iron structure is unique in Scottish bridge structures due to the method of casting the hollow horizontal strength members.

Many thanks to the Volunteers who gave their valuable time to this project, the Gargunnock Windfarm Fund Panel and the Gargunnock Community Trust in granting the funds to support this community project on behalf of FALCK Renewables.

If you enjoyed volunteering on this project keep a look out for the footpath projects that are being developed at various locations around the village and donate a bit more of your time to these worthwhile community projects.

Bus Changes

Good news - the C11/C12 Cambusbarron detour has been resolved. From 7th January 2019 all Balfron C12 evening buses will revert to the daytime route via Dumbarton Road. There will be a slight difference in departure times from the bus station.

Stirling to Balfron evening buses will leave at 18.44. 19.10 (Friday/Saturday only) 20.42. 22.59. There may also be minor changes to services coming from Balfron, not yet available, so please check times prior to your journey. We hope the return to this route will encourage more people to go to Stirling in the evening, as access to restaurants, the Albert Halls and The Smith Gallery will now be much easier.

Resolving the above issue has merely taken us back to where we originally were some years ago so there is still a lot to do to improve public transport. The campaign for Sunday Transport is now top of the list and we hope the newly elected Community Councils in the surrounding villages will join together and help support these efforts. There has also been some improvement with regards to the heating on a few of the Balfron buses. We hope this improves further and continues throughout the winter. Please continue to report these and any other issues including water ingress and dirty buses. Passengers should also remember to check bus stop information leading up to Christmas as First often run extra Saturday Services during this period.

Senior Citizens Christmas Welfare Vouchers

Within the next few days the Senior Citizens (over 65s) in the village should be receiving their Christmas Gift Vouchers. The continued generosity of the Gala Committee, together with a grant from the Wind Farm Trust has allowed us to continue with this village tradition for another year. The scheme was initiated by the late Miss Stirling, Gargunnock House, in 1965 and has continued, unbroken, each year since then. The early committees contained representatives from all of the village organisations, (e.g. school, 'Rural', farmers' club, church etc) and were originally set up to organise the newly introduced 'Meals on Wheels' service. Miss Stirling felt that they could, and should, be doing more to acknowledge the contribution made by our seniors to the life and work of the village, so the scheme was set up. It is interesting to note that our Gift Voucher Scheme has outlasted the Council's Meals on Wheels!

The scheme is open to everyone over 65, and is a gift from the village. We would like you to accept it as such and enjoy using it. The only rule we must apply is that each voucher is spent in a single transaction. If you fulfil the criteria but have not received a voucher, please accept our apologies and contact Anne on 860657 who will make sure you are added to our 'list'. Remembrance Service

A wreath was also laid at the Flagpole by Helen Rowell and her son, Willie. This was a poignant moment for Helen, a descendant of Trooper George Brocksopp, the last name on the War Memorial for the 1914-1918 War. When Helen and family came to Gargunnock in1990 she was surprised to see her maiden name on the Gargunnock War Memorial and decided to find out why Trooper Brocksopp was on a memorial so far from home.

George was born in1892 in a hamlet in north Derbyshire, near Sheffield but by 1914 records show him as a stud groom for Sir George Younger, Viscount Younger of Leckie. Charles Younger, the third son of Sir George is the only other Lothian and Borders soldier on our Memorial and we speculate that George Brocksopp went with him to war as his groom or similar. Trooper Brocksopp was killed at Flanders on 30th March 1918 and is commemorated on the memorial to those without a known grave at Pozieres in France.

We would like to express our appreciation of the thoughtfulness of the motorist who stopped in Leckie Road during the short Act of Remembrance. The Church Bells were rung, by John McLaren and Ken Stewart, at 12.30pm as part of the National 'Ring for Peace – Armistice 100' to commemorate what occurred on the 11th day of the 11th month 1918. Thanks to both gentlemen.


Sunday 30th December at 10.30am we will give thanks for 2018 and seek God's blessing for another new year.

The current ward priorities for the Forth and Endrick area are Antisocial Behaviour, Road Safety, Theft and Community Engagement and Reassurance. The following is a summary of local policing activity since the last edition of The Bugle.

Antisocial Behaviour

Gargunnock seems to be a popular place for hare coursing. The people responsible for this type of crime generally have lurcher style dogs. They arrive in an area, park their cars and the take the dogs onto open farm land. They usually walk in a line with the wind blowing towards them. If you see any such behaviour please contact the police.

PC Laura Robertson is our Local Wildlife Officer and she is extremely keen clamp down robustly on this type of activity.

Laura was involved in an incident on the outskirts of the village whereby a tree was felled which contained a red squirrel's dray (nest). One red squirrel was sadly killed. The SSPCA were summoned and fortunately the other 3 red squirrels were saved. The person responsible was traced and reported regarding his actions.

Road Safety

The Central Scotland Safety Camera Partnership and Police Scotland have continued to perform speed enforcement and hi-visibility patrols in and around Gargunnock, resulting in a number of motorists being given advice regarding their vehicle or manner of driving, or prosecuted where appropriate. We will continue to carry out such patrols and checks over the coming months.

There have been numerous calls in relation to sheep, cows and horses on the roads in the Forth and Endrick area so please be extra vigilant and careful on your travels. Please check and maintain your vehicle for road worthiness. The winter weather causes roads and driving conditions to be hazardous. This includes ensuring that vehicle windscreens are defrosted and you have a full view of the road ahead prior to driving off. On that note, please do not defrost the windscreen by leaving your engine running unattended on the road or driveway.

Theft

In the last few months in other villages in the Forth and Endrick area there have been a number of commercial housebreakings. None have been reported recently in the Gargunnock area however please report anything you feel suspicious to the Police.

Police Message for Local Residents

Recently the clocks went back an hour to mark the end of British Summer Time. This also marks the start of the darker nights which can make it easier for thieves to target your property if they can see that nobody is home. We need your help to make it make it harder for the thieves so please consider the following:

- Use timer switches on lights and radios to make it look as if your home is occupied.
- Ensure all doors and windows are secure when you leave and when you go to bed.
- If possible use secure lighting at the front and back of your property.
- Make sure all garden tools and ladders are locked away when not being used. Don't give the thieves the tools to break into your house.
- Use a good quality lock on any garden sheds and outhouses.
- Make a note of all makes, models and serial numbers of expensive items in your home.
- create a FREE and secure inventory of all your personal property at www.immobilise.com
 - If you note anything suspicious in your neighbourhood report it on 101.

PC Gary Martin and PC Steven Graham would like to take this opportunity to wish everyone a very safe and enjoyable festive period and extend their best wishes for the New Year.





It's been over one year since my friends and I (collectively known as the Gentlemen Gouffers of Gargunnock...maybe you've heard of us?) passed through your town and our memories of doing so are still among the most prominent of our trip. We met several lovely and/or interesting people and enjoyed our time there.

I'm not sure why it only now occurred to me to contact Gargunnock proper about our trip. But better late than never, right? Anyway, here is a little bit about us in case you're interested:

- Six golfers played across Scotland one year ago. When I say 'across Scotland', I mean that literally. We tee'd off in the surf of the east coast and played non-stop until we hit our balls into the west coast 3,555 strokes, 5 days, 232 golf balls, roughly 72 miles (about 50% more than what we anticipated due to last-second reroutes & distractions), 200,000 steps, over 200 pints. We raised over \$7,000 for a local charity and several news outlets covered our expedition. We were the very first people to ever golf Scotland coast to coast!

We began joking around that we should turn around because this is 'Gargunnock territory' and they are beasts known to eat golfers. Well for 25 years we joked about the 'dreaded Gargunnock' and then, while planning this trip, we noticed that our route would take us near Gargunnock so we decided to adjust it to go through Gargunnock and in doing so, fate gave us our group's name. If you click the first link below*, you'll see the mythology we built around it in preparation for our trip. FYI thankfully, no golfers were lost (although, one of our 6 had to grab a taxi to the next town as he sprained his ankle about ½ a mile from entering Gargunnock…hmmm).
- We met several of our favorite Scots in Gargunnock, including one linguist that corrected how we pronounced your town's name and gave us some great history on the town and another guy who, at 9 PM at night came out his front door and warned us not to proceed (we were leaving Gargunnock and it was starting to get dark (we had glow in the dark golf balls) and given the legend of the Gargunnock*, his very spooky warning actually gave us a moment's pause).

Glebe Land Tree Planting Project

I am writing with major concern that the Gargunnock Community Trust are about to spend a significant amount of money; circa £18,000 converting the wooded area at the Glebe to a more wooded area at the Glebe by planting 200 trees. Whilst I agree with the formation of a proper path through the area to link with the 'Ladies Walk', speaking to several villagers we believe that the money could be much better spent. Whilst the plans laid out in the September copy of the Bugle were highly detailed, in my view there was one major omission; the fact that it is going to cost the village approximately £10,000 as I understand that this is the sum being contributed to the project from the Gargunnock wind farm fund. This seems a great deal of money to spend on an area which I would like to remind everyone is an interim fix prior to a more permanent and sustainable legacy being proposed and implemented.

The wind farm fund provides the village with £22,000 per year. Therefore, as a village we could ask the question why haven't the Trust looked at approaching the land owner and commissioning a survey to see whether a hydroelectric scheme could be installed to generate power for the village; given the amount of water that flows down the Gargunnock hills? Alternatively, look at a project to replace all the Fuel inefficient Home Domestic boilers in the village as other communities have done with their wind farm money. As for the Glebe area why not look at alternative ideas to create a more useful area e.g. an all-weather surface for multi sports for adults and children – basketball, netball, tennis, five aside football which whilst not the highest response to the original survey on land usage, would give a voice to the youth of this village who are fewer in numbers and therefore marginalised.

To date there has only been one big ticket item creating a legacy for the village and that is the wonderful Open Learning Zone at the school. Given the fact that the Trust receives almost £22,000 per annum and will do so for the next 20 years+ let's not squander a fantastic opportunity to do something significant with this money. I implore the village to make their ideas known to the Trust and let's create something we can all use and be proud of.
