Summer Wildlife Around Gargunnock

June is a wonderful time to go out walking around the village.

Baby birds in nearly every tree, summer visitors will be returning back, and you may even see the spotted flycatcher.

Lots of colourful wildflowers; Foxgloves, daisies, and buttercups. Butterflies will be easy to spot in flight especially the Peacock, Red Admiral, and Commas.

Pregnant female bats form roosts and gather together to give birth. They will have one pup each and remain with them until 1 month old. At this age the young bat will be able to forage and look after themselves. Regularly seen in flight at dusk and after dark.

If out walking early you may even spot a roe deer fawn or two.

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UPDATE ON THE GARGUNNOCK VILLAGE SHOP

On the 12th May the Gargunnock Community Council (GCC) held an open meeting for the village residents to hear Business Consultant Dave Hollings outline the results of his work in relation to the potential purchase of the Village Shop. Many thanks to the 50+ people that came along and also to the Gargunnock Community Trust (GCT) and the Windfarm Fund for supporting this initial work.



Dave's presentation included a summary of some existing data on Community Shops based upon nearly 400 examples across the UK (37 in Scotland). It also utilised data from a previous shop owner before the current owner took over the shop. A couple of take away points from the presented data: over 90% of community shops survive, however running one is no 'gold mine'. Financials from a previous Gargunnock shop owner show turnover in excess off £300,000 but slim profit margins – just over £30k per year.

There was good engagement with the attendees with a variety of questions covering a range of topics including the suitability of the financial data considering it was pre pandemic, contact with the existing owners, cost of

purchase and alternative locations for the shop (Drop In Centre at Community Centre or Pub).

The location of the shop and associated business case for these alternatives were discussed at a high level with concerns raised about the community purchasing another building in addition to the Community Centre and Drop In Centre - both of which have their own challenges in terms of financial sustainability.

Based on this, it was suggested that the Drop In Centre could be a safer option financially given the community already own it. Plus, the footprint of the Drop In Centre could lend itself to extended services of a shop to include seating etc. This was countered by the fact the Drop In Centre sits on the outskirts of the village and is not as central as the existing shop. Potentially a deterrent for residents with mobility issues which in turn could have an impact on footfall. It would also require a change of use request to Stirling Council – however, this is not foreseen to be an issue.

All great points for further discussion and all options need to be thoroughly reviewed in terms of preferred location, financials and liabilities.

The existing shop is currently having repair work being done, and it is assumed the owners will not set up a shop again themselves. Recent attempts to contact the current owners have not been successful so this cannot be confirmed until it is put on the market for sale.

Both the Drop In Centre and the current shop location are being reviewed as potential locations and the GCC is exploring a variety of funding sources for potential purchase of the existing shop or retrofitting of the Drop In Centre. To facilitate this, we will establish a Community Benefit Society (CBS) that will be an independent entity separate from the Trust and Council that would be responsible for everything to do with the shop – regardless of its location. So the Trust would bear no risk or liability

Once established, the residents of Gargunnock will have the opportunity to buy shares in the CBS if they wish.

- Q I am on Main Street and can't display at my front door?
- A You can display anywhere else in the Village, as long as it is in a safe position. Alistair Jackson has said that he would be happy for anyone to use the grassy area behind the notice board, and there is also plenty room at the Square behind the fountain.

GETTING READY FOR THE FLOWER SHOW?

What to do now...

- Plant out your dahlias. Choose a site that gets plenty of sun and is protected from the wind. Flow-ering should start mid-Summer.
- Deadhead your Spring Bulbs. Cut the flower stems off at the base. When the leaves die back in a few weeks the strength will get stored in the bulb for next year.
- Tie in your young sweet pea shoots close to the supports.
- Sow hardy annuals such as nasturtiums direct into the soil.
- Plant out bedding plants and gladioli corns in sunny locations
- Earth up your early potatoes, and keep watering them. There is still time to plant maincrop tubers.
- If you have sown turnips, they should be ready to be thinned out.
- And.....as at any time, get rid of weeds!!

Every home in the Village received a Flower Show Schedule, so check the list of entries so that you can prepare for as many as you can. Please help to make this year's Show a resounding success, following the cancellation the last 2 years.

Paths Group Update.

The most visible proof of the Path groups activities over the past months has been the upgrading and re routing of Charlie's Loan, a core path linking Main Street to Leckie Road. A new 51 metre section has been added avoiding the old steps which had significantly deteriorated and constituted a potential safety hazard. A significant achievement and thanks go to Pete Rowell for his enthusiastic leadership of the volunteer workforce. To Stirling Council for the provision of most of the materials and to the Windfarm Panel for the funding of ancillary materials. But most of all to the volunteers of all ages, sizes and physical abilities who made it all possible. In total there were 13 work parties held amounting to 140 hours of effort, an achievement to be proud of!

A notable milestone has been achieved by the group spearheading the Gargunnock to Stirling pathway. Following on from the completion of the concept design phase a submission has been made to Sustrans for funding to allow for Detailed and Technical design work to enable this challenging project to continue.

Following a series of meetings with Senior Stirling Council Officers we are delighted to report their full support in taking this pathway project forward.

It should also be noted that the village survey on cycling showed strong support not only for the Gargunnock to Stirling Pathway but also for this project to be continued westward on the ancient route of The King's Highway

The Gargunnock Community Trust is in the final stages of completing a Consultative Paths Strategy which will be posted on the Trust's website and the noticeboard on which feedback is being sought.

Charles "Pansy" Kay of Mill Farm

A couple of years back the church had a successful open day which included a video of church history and static displays plus conducted tours of the graveyard. One of the characters described in the tours was that of Charles Kay of the Mill Farm, now known as Millmuir. Apart from farming his hobby was growing pansies and violas and indeed it was that which earned him his unusual nickname.

He appears in a corner of the photo of the assembled dignitaries and villagers at the inauguration of our first piped water supply in 1910. Apart from a eulogy in the Church Supplement on his death in 1913 that was all I knew of him.

However, about a fortnight after the open-day, out of the blue, Nimmo and his portrait visiting eminent in less, emailed me, looking for Lawton Wingate PR information about the Kays That happy coincidence and the fact that 2019 was the 225th




anniversary of the Gargunnock Farmer's Club came together to greatly expand my knowledge of the Kays of Gargunnock.

Clark Nimmo lives in Northallerton, Yorkshire. His aunt Agnes, Charlie's granddaughter, is now 95 years young and enjoying life in a care-home now although in 2019 she was still living on her own. Through our contact Nimmo and I exchanged lots of information. Even better, later that summer he came to visit Gargunnock and brought Agnes with him. She turned out to be full of energy and bright as a button with а memory undimmed by age. Bv coincidence it turned out that Catriona McNee here in

Viewfield was a childhood friend so a visit was quickly arranged, an unexpected highlight for both ladies. Nimmo told me later that he just sat quietly in the background, sipping his sherry, while the two ladies exchanged many past memories.

The Kay family of farmers farmed here from about the middle of the 19th to well into the 20th century in the Hillhead, Mains and the Mill Farms before leaving the area in the late 1920s. The minutes books of the local Farmers Club, founded in the 1790s and on display at their 225th anniversary show, revealed their name appearing both as office bearers of the club and regular prizewinners. There is also a gravestone in our churchyard inscribed, *"In Memory of John Kay, Farmer & Inn Keeper"* and at one point the club held their meetings in "Mrs Kay's Inn." I wonder which one that was as at one time or another there were 4 Inns here.

Charlie tenanted the Mill Farm and like his forebears



Charlie published a book on his hobby and his portrait was painted by visiting eminent artist, Sir James Lawton Wingate PRSA excelled in his profession as also he did in his hobby of growing and breeding pansies and violas, so much so that his name (and nickname) became known far and wide throughout Britain. He even published a little red book in 1890 entitled "Notes on the Propagation & Cultivation of the Pansy" in which he set out his experiences and recommendations.

On Enemies of the Pansy he wrote...

"A sharp lookout should be kept on the snails for at least two weeks before a show...A visit should be made to the pansy beds every other night with a lantern, just before going to bed to intercept any that are making for the blooms."

He was well read too and a great protagonist of Shakespeare. In those days prominent artists visited our village and one of them, Sir James Lawton Wingate, even painted his portrait.

After his death in 1913 the Scottish Gardener and Northern Forester wrote...

"As a farmer and stock breeder he excelled...His services as a judge were much in request ... in various parts of the country. For more than a quarter of a century he had been the leading raiser of Pansies and Violas in Britain ... No one did so much to popularise the Pansy and Viola...

...While he could denounce anything that savoured of a shady nature in no measured terms he was withal a man of a genial, hospitable nature, generous to a degree, always wiling to help by advice or otherwise; he enjoyed the respect and esteem of all who knew him."

So there we are. Through a series of happy coincidences the story of the eminent Kay farming family in Gargunnock, and in particular that of Charles "Pansy" Kay, has been retold so that more than 100 years after his demise he lives on in our memories for at least a wee while longer.

Public exhibition and consultation: Wed 15 June 2022

Naturalis Energy Development Ltd, a joint venture partnership between Falck Renewables and Reg Power Management Ltd, are experienced renewable energy developers and have been undertaking environmental studies for a windfarm located approximately 4km south of the village of Gargunnock, Stirling.

The project would form an extension to the existing Earlsburn Wind Farm. The proposals are at an early stage but we believe the site has the capacity to accommodate up to 15 turbines with tip heights of up to 180m. If developed, this renewable energy project would make a meaningful contribution toward meeting the Scottish net zero carbon target by 2045, by providing clean, green energy.

Don't worry if you are unable to attend the above sessions. You can still provide feedback or ask questions about the proposals via the project website at **www.earlsburnextension.co.uk**.

Our assessments will continue over the summer and we will be carrying out further drop-in sessions later in the year where we will share the results of these studies and proposals with you, ahead of the formal submission of a planning application.

Theft

There have been no thefts reported in the Gargunnock area, however thefts have occurred in the Blanefield area so please be vigilant and look after your property.

What basic steps can I take to protect my home?

Having your home broken into is not common. There are however many ways that you can help secure your home. They don't all cost money – some are common sense and good housekeeping. Here are a few basic steps that can keep your home safe:

- Keep your home locked at all times
- Many thieves do not need to break in at all because a door or window has been left open or unlocked
- Don't leave keys on the inside of door locks, under mats or anywhere else they can be easily found
- Don't leave valuables where they can be see through a window
- If you have a wall calendar, avoid having it shown near a window from where appointments can be seen - people may see when there will be no one in.
- Ensure all doors and windows are secure when you leave and when you go to bed.
- If possible use secure lighting at the front and back of your property.
- Make sure all garden tools and ladders are locked away when not being used. Don't give the thieves the tools to break into your house

If your house is fitted with an alarm then please use it. This is a good deterrent should thieves manage to force entry to your house.

Fuel theft advice

There has been a rise in domestic and commercial fuel tanks. It's important to put measures in place to protect your fuel tank and make it extremely difficult for thieves to target your fuel.

Please find below some tips to avoid becoming a victim of such a crime:

- Locate your tank in a safe location remembering that many thieves use Google Maps to find satellite images of fuel tanks.
- Consider locating your tank behind a garage or shed and away from roads. Positioning it close to your business or home will ensure it's in clear view.
- Locate inside a security gate or cage with a good quality, robust fence or cage to make life difficult for thieves.
- Install an alarm Consider fitting alarms to external gates surrounding your fuel tank or to the inside of a shed or outbuilding that is housing the tank.
- Fit a fuel theft lock, thieves often come armed with tools so it's worth investing in quality locks, locking fuel caps and anti-siphoning

deterrents to slow down the criminals and reduce the likelihood of success. Locks with a CEN or BSEN 12320 Grade 6 classification indicate maximum security (Grade 1 is the least secure)

- Install outdoor security lighting positioning your tank in the bright light is an effective solution worth considering. With the majority of thieves striking at night, installing automatic security lighting will help stop criminals from targeting your fuel tank.
- Put up signage to highlight the security measures you've installed can help deter those up to no good. These could include: Private property, keep out, Warning CCTV in operation, All vehicles are left with minimum fuel, Security patrols in operation, All vehicles fitted with security devices etc

Poaching

Hare coursing is illegal under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981. Anyone involved in this activity will usually use lurchers, greyhounds, and whippet dogs to chase the hares, but the motive is rarely to take the hare but to treat it as a sport.

It is predominantly a seasonal crime occurring during the Spring as crops emerge into fields and during late Summer and early Autumn when the crops have been harvested. However, it can occur at any time of the year.

There have been incidents of hare coursing in the Gargunnock area in the past.

If you suspect a wildlife crime is/has taken place

Do:

- Report any suspicious activity as soon as possible to Police Scotland on 101 or 999 if it is an emergency, and ask to speak to a Wildlife Crime Officer if one is available
- Take note of the date, time, and weather conditions
- If possible, identify a map reference using the My Three Words app, or ideally a GPS reading of both the incident scene and location from where you witnessed the incident
- Note a description of person/s involved including gender, age, height, clothing, etc
- Write down any vehicle registration numbers, make, model, and colour that may be involved
- Identify other witnesses and obtain their name and contact details
- If possible, video or photograph the scene, or make a rough sketch
- Cover up any suspected poisoned baits or victims to prevent any animal or person from coming into contact with them.
- Do report. Even if you are not sure report the incident. The evidence of wildlife crime is not always obvious.

Do <u>Not</u>:

- Do not disturb the scene by moving items or walking about unnecessarily
- Do not touch dead animals or birds, especially if you suspect that poison may have been used
- Do not interfere with legal countryside practices such as the legal use of traps and snares, hides, high seats, and shooting butts.

Never:

• Never approach suspects or intervene if you suspect someone is committing a wildlife crime – you may put yourself in danger.

Down at the farm—update from Old Leckie

Despite the sun (occasionally) shining and the temperatures lifting, the clouds of increasing cost pressures are never far away. As with every other household and business it feels that almost everything is increasing with cost. We are grateful to have no oil or gas on the farm (our heating is generated by our bio mass boiler) and our switch to the electric van helps keep our delivery costs in check. Following on from a three fold increase in fertiliser prices however our hen feed costs have doubled and we've just been advised our butchery is now 50% more expensive that it was. Regrettably there is some number crunching to be done.

Early summer has however well and truly arrived at the farm and a walk around the farm gives a welcome distraction. Swallows and house martins flit past the farm buildings at every turn. The martins somewhat perilously cling to the high windows of the old house in their search for a suitable window nook to begin their painstaking efforts to build a nest from mud. The grass has had good growth with the alternate rain and sunshine that we had in May. The cattle are out of their winter housing and slowly munching their way round the fields – the heart lifts to see them with the sun on their backs.

In the carse fields the grass we grow for winter feed is suddenly long enough to turn our minds to weather forecasts and opportunities to harvest our first cut of silage. As the grass bends and waves with the wind we are continually looking over the fields to spot tell tale signs of deer activity – indicating perhaps a hidden young one deep in the grass. We are hopeful for success from a Curlew nest, a rarity these days, we will minimise risk to the nest by later cutting of this field and will try to get on top of the large number of predatory carrion crows.

Our April born lambs are growing well – often congregating in large groups to race up and down the fence lines. As we continue our daily stock checks the odd one or two come back to the farm for some extra care – their mothers unable to feed them sufficiently. We now have 8 pet lambs the girls are looking after. Regular milk bottle feeds mean that they are always delighted to see people and they are the highlight of our schedule of school visits.
