Walk of Hope 2024

On 17th April 2024, 3 Dads Walking commenced their latest 500 mile walk in aid of the **PAPYRUS**, **Prevention of Young Suicide** Charity for which they have already raised well over £1m. Andy, Tim & Mike have each tragically lost a daughter to suicide.

On the previous evening, having stayed overnight here at the Beild farm with John and Joan More, a short presentation was held in the Gargunnock Inn where they received a cheque for £800 for the charity. No less than £440 of that was raised in Gargunnock Inn via a quiz and raffle under the capable hands of Quiz master George Goodall who decided to add to that total the money generated from similar events at the Fintry Inn and the Lion & Unicorn, Thornhill.

The 3 Dads expressed their grateful thanks and commented on how generous they had found everyone here to be.

Their fund-raising walks have enabled the charity to accelerate its growth plans. In 2023, **PAPYRUS** extended the opening hours of its suicide prevention helpline **HOPELINEUK** from 9am-midnight up to a 24/7 service. More offices have also been opened throughout the country. From an original 5 it now has 18, with more in the pipeline, extending its reach and influence.

Having been asked many times 'When are you walking down the east side of the country?' the 3 Dads decided they could do that by designing their next walk to highlight some of the newly opened (and soon to open) offices in areas they had not been to before. Their route this time took them from the Stirling office across to Edinburgh then south to Newcastle and Leeds before turning east for Hull, to cross the Humber Bridge and make their way south to the finish in Norwich on 11th May.

For the second year running a Gala Queen was chosen and feted before being crowned to preside over the afternoon's festivities. This year's queen was Wendy Hutchinson and her Lady-in waiting was Lynn Bennett. Mrs Mc Callum of Stark Street performed the ceremonials and also judged the fancy dress competitions.

Side—shows run by the members of the Cricket Club added to the entertainment during the afternoon but pride of place in the music stakes went to the efforts of David Methven and his fellow pipers and drummers of the Central Region Youth Pipe Band.


Bite and Blether

Gargunnock Quarterly Magazine, Winter Edition 1987. 37 years ago. Me in my early 40s sampling one of the new-fangled All Terrain Bikes down at Glentress near Peebles.

I have often been a born-again cyclist. Every 10 to 15 years I "discover" cycling again for a few years then it tails off a bit as other things take up my attention. But always I return to it as a pleasant form of exercise.

There are plenty of quieter roads in this area to enjoy, the only trouble is you must use the busier roads to get to them. The A811 Dumbarton Road or the A84 Callander Road to name but two are not for the faint-hearted although I have almost never had any problems with them. Choose your time and they're OK really. Pretty much all motorists obey the distance from cyclists rules now, apart from foreigners on the A84 driving left-hand-drive vehicles, which is understandable when you think about it.

My latest foray back into cycling came with lockdown when we were all out walking round Leckie till that became a bit repetitive so the old bike was retrieved from the garage for the first time in years. The roads were quiet to begin with and the cycling was pleasant, but one thing soon became apparent. The hills had become a lot steeper than I remembered them!

The one that always defeated me was on the Glinns road up past Auld Hall Farm, it gets steeper and steeper as you climb towards Ballochleam. Nothing to do with advancing years of course but, never one to ignore new technology, I borrowed a friends e-bike to try out around the village hills and that convinced me it was the solution.

On the e-bike the Manse Brae was climbed no bother, followed by Quarry Road up to the old sawmill site. On the flat a stiff headwind likewise gave no problems. So, what is an e-bike? Well, it is a bike with a battery and an electric motor which gives you various levels of assistance provided you are pushing the pedals. Stop pushing them and the motor stops assisting you. Or if you reach a speed more than 15.50 mph the motor will cut out. Simple. There's no throttle, it's all down to you pushing the pedals so you still get exercise.



2024 Me again, now well into my latest cycling resurrection as an octogenarian cyclist on my beloved e-bike which I reckon has taken 60 years off my cycling age.

The result is that suddenly you're performing like you did 60 years ago when you were younger and fitter. What's not to like?

Well the not so likeable bit is the effect on your wallet of buying one so you need to know how much to spend or not to spend to give you what you want. One of the first questions asked about these bikes is how far will it go on a charge? That depends on a lot of variable factors; your weight, type of road, wind speed & direction, speed of travel, gradient of road, gear and size of battery. The battery is expensive.

However I can tell you that over 81 circular, mixed rides from the village over the last 2 years my average power consumption has been 8-10 WattHours per mile travelled. Divide that into the rated WattHr figure for the battery of the bike you're considering to give you an approximate projected mileage.

OK you'll consume double that rate or more on very steep sections if you push things a bit but on a circular run you'll always have the benefit of the corresponding downhill run on the way back.

Strong wheels and fat tyres will allow you to explore the line of the unsurfaced old Kings Highway from here westwards through Leckie & Boquhan estates to Kippen then the Jennywoodston road from there to the road leading down to the A811 at Arnprior and thence to Port of Menteith and return via Thornhill.

The Glinns road up through Burnton, past Ballochleam to Lernock Toll and beyond to Balfron is there just waiting to be explored in spite of its many gradients.

Hours and hours of endless enjoyment for the born-again cyclist like me....or you perhaps if you care to give it a try? See you.

Trust News May 2024

EGM: At the recent Extraordinary General Meeting the members and trustees in attendance (thanks to those who came along), after a presentation and discussion about the pros and cons, approved the resolution to convert the trust from a limited company to a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation. (SCIO). Following that a further decision was made to adopt the draft constitution, with amendments proposed at the meeting, which had been prepared by Stirling Voluntary Enterprise. We are now going through the formal application process with OSCR, the Scottish charity regulator. This change will improve the efficiency of running the trust which will be welcomed by the volunteers, who give up so much of their own time for the community. We will be getting in touch with all existing members (that's everyone in the village who have previously completed a membership form) to update their membership details at some point in the future.

Community Centre: The trust has agreed several improvements to the Community Centre which it owns and manages on behalf of the village. In early July the entrance to the car park will be upgraded to get rid of the potholes! Work has already taken place to increase the worktop space in the kitchen by replacing the old fridge freezer with a new fridge and countertop. (Thanks to Roddy Chambers for the generous gift of his expertise and time.) Also, a new hot water boiler will soon be installed. We are also investigating the installation of a new container at the rear to the Centre to accommodate the range of bikes which have been purchased. The bikes will soon be available to the community, (watch this space!). We are also considering the installation of a large TV monitor in the Garden Room so that groups can give presentations etc. Many of these improvements are in response to the feedback from the growing number of customers.

Telephone box: Having recently taken over responsibility from the Community Council for the 'defibrillator' telephone box next to the shop, the trust plans to undertake repairs (Again thanks to Roddy Chambers) and repaint it. This will be done once the shop project has been completed. We are also considering installing another defibrillator at the east end of the village.


Liquor Licence:

Since our last update, we are delighted to share that there have been another five successful grants awarded by the Windfarm Panel, across a number of different community groups and individuals. The awards granted in March were-

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NOT ALL RHODODENDRONS ARE PURPLE!

If any local folk have walked along the driveway past Gargunnock House recently they will have passed the masses of rhododendrons and azaleas planted there. The flowering this year is the best ever! Lots of rain last year to form the buds and little or no frost this Spring. Many of the older rhodies were planted by the last laird Miss Viola Stirling in the nineteen fifties and sixties. They were added to more recently by Willie Campbell a gardener there for nearly 20 years. In retirement, he is still planting Rhodies in the East Glen conservation area. There are a few purple ones around but many other colours to delight the eye. The species purple Rhododendron ponticum - is the one that gets the bad press and can be seen in many areas of Scotland where it has naturalised. Gargunnock estate was able to get grants to remove it from much of the lower woodland in early 2000s and so far it has not reappeared much. The gardens are open by arrangement for Scotland's Gardens Scheme.

This was particularly topical because of the recent excavation of an ancient Pictich Stone with very unusual Ogham script found in the cemetery.

Along at Old Leckie there has been a collective sigh of relief that the relentless rain of spring has finally ceased. April brought with it the usual busy lambing period – overall a good lambing at the farm, but a hard one that required constant shifting around of sheep and new borns to dodge the worst of the weather. With the sun out and temperature lifting the 'growing season' is now well and truly upon us. Driving along the Carse it will have been hard to miss tractors out harrowing, seeding, fertilising and spraying. With the cows only just out their wintering sheds the first silage (winter feed) is getting cut for local dairy farms and we would hope to get our first made in June. And so the cycle goes on!

Livestock wise our spring calving went well, the final calf being born last week to the black highlander in the corner field by the sheds. It's a cross with our heritage Angus Bull Eoin and is a happy wee thing despite initially latching onto one of the male highlanders in the same field (much to his dismay). The lambs are



growing well and the next few weeks will see us setting up gates out in the fields to bring them in for checking and dosing and the all important task of selecting some for entry to the Gargunnock Show on 1st June.

Summer is always busy for farm tours. We have bookings in for tourists from all round the world to come and explore the farm and get a real sense of what farming in Scotland is all about. We're also looking forward to welcoming Gargunnock Playgroup and Toddlers for their end of term outing and some local primary schools, supported by the Royal Highland Educational Trust – fingers crossed the weather stays good!

On the local produce side our new Leckie Layers have settled well into their new laying patterns and we've picked up a few new customers recently. If you're out and about and eating at The United Auctions' Deli, Nick's, Friends of Mine or Havn butchery in Bridge of Allan you can enjoy our free range eggs. Salad season has been slow to start with Alison having been away during April. Transplanting has begun though so we hope to have some ready into June. We've got loads of our grass fed native beef and pork in the freezer available for order, and it's been great to get so much positive feedback on our beef – the cross between the Highlanders and our Aberdeen Angus is working really well and delivering fabulous taste and quality. An oasis in the damp

Everyone deserves a quirky hobby, and mine is cacti. I hope to provide some enlightenment into this curious hobby at a later date. But after nearly a decade in the village I finally have a new greenhouse and I can give my collection the light it needs. I am already being rewarded and would like to share a picture of the first flowers of the season.

These cacti are a few of my Rebutia hybrids. At a little over 1 inch in size they reward with a display nearly 6 inches across. In light pink we have Rebutia "Magic Moment" and Rebutia "Roxanne". In dark pink we have Rebutia "Victoria" and Rebutia "Marina".

And for a bit of bright orange contrast, this is Rebutia "Georgia". More cacti are coming into bud and I hope to share some more with you.
